Course Description:	A dynamic experiential education course providing the academic structure to maximize a student’s learning from an internship experience and connect it to both their course of study and their career aspirations. The course includes frequent professional networking opportunities for interns across our global centers as well as guest lectures from acclaimed professionals in relevant fields.

These goals should be discrete and achievable, as well as specific to the student’s assigned placement, rather than the internship program in general. Goals will be tied to learning areas: Academic Engagement, Cultural Exploration, Career Development, etc. Ensure that you have researched your company and reflected on the interview process and the opportunities identified during this process.</p> <p>Class and Guest Lecture Participation (25%) Consistent and meaningful participation is critical to student success in this course. 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engagement with the readings, discussions, and guest lecture presentations. The Participation grade is divided as follows:

- in-class and written comments on readings 10 %
- guest lectures 20% (pre-meeting questions or questions asked live; video/written comments after the lecture; reaction to other student's comments on guest lectures)

Diversity and Inclusion Policy Proposal (10%)

Based on a report provided by the instructor, students will investigate their internship placement workplace policies on diversity and inclusion, as well as their own individual observations of their experiences with diversity and inclusion at the organization. Students will provide a critique of what they have experienced in the form of a written proposal of 1000 words on how to address and/or change issues of diversity and inclusion they have uncovered, witnessed, or experienced at the workplace.

Organizational Structure Analysis (10%)

Based on an article provided by the instructor, students will examine the organizational structure and lines of command of their workplace organization and think about the kind of workplace they would like to work at after graduation. The written analysis should be 500 words and include one slide to be presented in class.

Digital Resume Portfolio (10%)

Students are to construct a digital professional portfolio. This portfolio needs to include a resume, an updated LinkedIn (or relevant alternative) profile and a cover letter in response to a chosen live job advert. The Portfolio will be presented in class and discussed with the other students and with the Professor. The presentation has to last no more than 15 minutes per student and should address how any professional goals may have changed.

Student Conference Project and Presentation (20%)

During the final week of placement, students will have to present a group project for the Student Conference on a topic chosen among those covered by the guest lectures: International Networking, Circular Economy, Diversity & Inclusion. Students will select and consult at least three academic papers on the topic. These articles serve to analyze a case study in line with the topic and apply the new theoretical concepts. The case study is based on any organization that demonstrates a best practice in the field or it can be one of the companies/organizations a student is placed with. As part of the project students will create a 30 minute presentation to be discussed in class addressing the case study and any potential proposal recommendations as a result of the case study analysis.

Final Personal Reflection Paper (20%)

Students are to reflect on their placement experience and consider:

- What did I learn about my industry?
- What did I learn about local workplace culture?
